# **Message from the Chancellor**

# Give your time, resources and expertise to help the less fortunate in our society, graduates told

n this congregation today are individuals, families and institutions that have over the years given generously to make this day possible. I invite you graduands to consider giving your time, resources and expertise in aid of the less fortunate in our society. Do not say that you have nothing to offer, because world over, those who give the most have the least. Perhaps you can mentor a child, or sponsor a child through school, or inspire a group.

As a philanthropist, I am aware of the difficulties around financing of higher education. Many of our citizens still experience difficulties meeting their financial obligations. The time has come for us to leverage on the abundant knowledge we possess to expand our revenue base and develop an endowment fund for the needy students.

You are graduating at a time of great challenges to public universities. Across the world, universities are besieged with technological, demographic and economic forces which they can no longer ignore. Rising costs and reduced state funding remain real threats to the existence of public universities across the world. There is need to reduce over-dependence on state support which has been on the decline and will continue to decline. Our focus on Module 2 is not the solution to the long term sustainability of our universities. In fact, we should open up to the untapped opportunities and in some instances may hurt the very purpose of our existence, research and knowledge advancement.

The University should take knowledge to the people and be part and parcel of the solution. Some of our lecturers have pioneered ways of engaging with the public and jointly seeking solutions to the many societal problems. It is this sort of interaction between the Government, universities and the private sector that creates employment and wealth in many successful countries.

We need to commercialize research output and create new industries that will employ our graduates. We need to add value to our agricultural produce, improve post harvest management and reduce vulnerability to food insecurity. I am encouraged that the College of Agriculture & the Veterinery Science is pioneering many innovative ways of adding value to and securing our agricultural produce.

I wish to single out the Fabrication Laboratory at the

School of Engineering that collaborates with MIT. This is a great opportunity to develop new machinery that can be used in manufacturing processes and mechanizing agriculture to create employment. # Message from the Vice-Chancellor

## Taking stock of achievements

It is my pleasure to welcome all of you to the University of Nairobi and in particular to the 52nd congregation of the University of Nairobi. I also take this opportunity to congratulate the graduands for their hard work, without which this occasion would not have taken place.

This Congregation is featuring

is graduands mainly from the: Colleges of Health Sciences, and Humanities and Social Sciences, and from a professional perspective, the congregation is releasing into the market 7,799 graduates comprising of: doctors, pharmacists, dentists, nurses, lawyers, economists, business executives and social scientists, among others, at different levels. The 52nd graduation will bring to over 95,000 graduates that we have conferred with degrees and diplomas in the last 10 years comprising; 7 honorary degrees, 3 DSc's, 495 PhDs, 18,951 Masters, 59,077 bachelors and 15,619 diplomas. Our alumni now standing at 173,134, makes the University of Nairobi the largest single contributor to the human resource capacity in the country. We will also confer 2 honorary doctorates to Dr. Vijoo H.M. Rattansi and Dr. Samuel K. Macharia for their exemplary service in different sectors of our country.

The University has achieved a sterling performance as posted in the recent

Webometric Ranking. Our outstanding performance confirms our long held view that the University of Nairobi is the gold standard of the region after emerging top in the region and position 9 in Africa ahead of all regional universities for the second time in six months. This performance is a climax of the great work by our staff and students in their academic pursuit; thus raising the visibility of the University worldwide. It also vindicates the strategic management systems that we have consciously put in place for the last 10 years and which are now bearing fruit. This improved performance is a build up to other excellent results that we have recorded in the past, especially in

performance contracting. Currently, the University of Nairobi holds the Excellent rank, in the public sector performance contracting, a standing that has never been attained by any other public entity, since the introduction of public sector reforms in 2004.

The University has experienced a lot of gains occasioned by the restructuring that has been put in place in the last 10 years. This improved state of affairs was due to the management's commitment to strategy that, among other things, laid emphasis on the growth of the University revenues through more enrolments, research grants and above all, prudent management of resources.

The frugal management of our scarce resources over the last 10 years has paid dividends. We not only managed to complete our stalled infrastructural projects of the 1990s, but we have also managed to initiate new ones. All our campuses now boast of new projects initiated or completed in the last 10 years. Cumulatively, we have spent over KES 3.5 billion on these projects. This investment is expected to rise sharply by KES 2.2 Billion, with the completion of the ongoing construction of the University Towers - now on the 22nd floor and set for completion next year. However, for this University to have the capacity to absorb the increasing need for higher education in the country, more quality facilities are required to support academic and social welfare of our students.

To meet these needs, the University plans to construct hostels to accommodate more than 5,000 students on a five acre piece of land next to the Fairmont Norfolk Hotel. This project will be financed under the Private Public Partnership model, and plans for its commencement are at an advanced stage. We have also lined up the construction of the School of Law Tower at the Parklands Campus, to house the increasing academic activities and offer a modern learning legal environment that is commensurate with the status of the School and affirm its position, among other leading law schools, worldwide.

I am also grateful for the support that I have received from the present and the previous government and particularly for non interference in the internal affairs of the University. I have been privileged to work under seven different ministers of higher education, and their support has been phenomenal. I however urge the government to extend this support in providing more capitation to the University to at least cater for the payroll so that the university can free its funds for development projects.

The other remedy is for the government to consider implementing unit costing in higher education. Universities offering courses that require more resources should be financed

at a level that is commensurate to their running costs, as opposed to uniform funding for all government sponsored students. If adopted, unit cost based funding will reduce the deficit, which has continually affected universities offering courses that require a lot of investment in learning materials and personnel.

As my term comes to a close, I commend the government and the University council for managing the recruitment of my successor with professionalism. The process yielded a candidate whom I trust will steer the University to greater accomplishments. I therefore take this opportunity to congratulate Prof. Peter Mbithi on his appointment as the seventh Vice-Chancellor of the University of Nairobi and wish him all the best as he prepares to assume office in January 2015.

I remain grateful to the many stakeholders who have played a leading role in ensuring that I delivered on the objectives of this great university. To my students and members of staff, I enjoyed your support and understanding. Most importantly the support I received from management particularly the members of the University Senate and the University Management Board, and students leaders was critical in moving this University forward.

# **New Vice-Chancellor appointed**

The University of Nairobi is pleased to announce the appointment of Prof. Peter M.F. Mbithi as the new Vice-Chancellor with effect from January 6th 2015 for a five-year term renewable once. Prof. Mbithi will take over from Prof. George Magoha whose final term expires in January 2015. He becomes the seventh Vice-Chancellor, since the inception of the University of Nairobi in 1970.

The appointment follows a rigorous and competitive recruitment process conducted by the University Council in October 2014. The formal appointment was made by the Cabinet Secretary, Education, Science and Technology, Prof. Jacob Kaimenyi as per Section 39, of the Universities Act.

Prof. Mbithi holds a Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine, Master of Science and PhD from the University of Nairobi and Master of Veterinary Science from the University of Saskatchewan, Canada. He is a prolific researcher, and has attended numerous international conferences, and published widely in his area of specialization.

Prof. Mbithi, a Professor of Veterinary Medicine, is the current Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Administration and Finance, having been appointed to the position in 2005. He has also served as the Principal of the College of Agriculture and Veterinary Sciences, Dean, Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Chairman, Department of Clinical Studies.

His landmark achievements at the University of Nairobi include: steering the institution to ISO certification, leading performance contracting, rapid results initiative, strategic planning and the service charter. Prof. Mbithi has been instrumental in tidying up the general physical appearance of the university and upgrading its infrastructure. As the Deputy the Vice-Chancellor, he was also in-charge of staff welfare including industrial relations.

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
